


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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

We are rapidly coming up to the 47th AGM at another quality Nova Scotian resort, Keltic Lodge. It is good to see the members of this professional association continue to hold their meetings at outstanding locations. I will attempt to highlight a few of the issues that have been dealt with by this office during the past year. Some items are new, while others are ongoing.

The negotiations with APENS with respect to their new act and our definition are proceeding at a snail's pace. After the APENS agm in 1996, there was a definite change in their position. Many of the issues we thought we had settled were brought back to the negotiating table by APENS. The committee met several times in 1997 with little progress being made. Currently there is correspondence being exchanged by the presidents in an effort to have the two professions reach agreement.

We continue to liaise with the provincial government on a number of issues, including the Planning Act and on-site sewage disposal systems. Presently, the new Planning Act has not been put forward for approval. The regulations for on-site sewage disposal systems are causing some delays and difficulties. We plan to present our concerns to the government on this issue in the near future.

At a municipal level, the association offered comments for new Consolidated Subdivision By-law for the Municipalities of the County of Inverness, the County of Richmond, the County of Victoria and the Town of

Port Hawkesbury. I did not attend the public meeting, but it is my understanding that several land surveyors did attend and offered comments to improve the new by-law. It is always encouraging to see our members involved in issues that affect this profession.

In the new Halifax Regional Municipality, we have forwarded our concerns with certain sections of the new Lot Grading and Drainage By-law to representatives of HRM and municipal councillors. We have also met with representatives of the HRM engineering department and provided written recommendations for change. I have been asked to sit on a subcommittee to discuss our concerns and other issues related to the by-law.

Earlier this year, this association was asked to be part of a provincial discussion group known as Professionals in Land Development. This group consists of representatives from other professions, including architects, landscape architects, planners, development officers, engineering technicians and others. The main topic of discussion was the proposed APENS act. All of the groups represented expressed concern with the new engineering act. The group meets about once a month and the discussions are very casual at this point.



Most of the problems stem from delays in completing the work and poor communication with the client and other land owners. We do have some success in resolving these issues. The Association of Canada Lands Surveyors and the New Brunswick branches of the Canadian Institute of Geomatics present a one-day seminar for Land Surveyors and their employees, and anybody interested in high accuracy GPS surveys. The focus is on the design, planning and execution of GPS surveys, and the assessment and presentation of the final results. A panel discussion session will be held where attendees can ask project-related and other questions of the GPS surveying experts present.

GPS vendors and manufacturers often give very optimistic descriptions of GPS accuracy and productivity and often professional surveyors have to perform GPS surveys with expensive rented equipment and little or no experience. This can result in cost and time overruns, surveys which do not meet accuracy requirements, coordinates which are unreliable because of poor survey design, and final values which may be inappropriate for their intended purpose.

This seminar is intended to provide surveyors with an understanding of what it takes to perform an accurate, reliable and efficient GPS survey. GPS concepts and theory are not described; only practical matters such as how to design a GPS survey to catch errors, how to realistically assess results, and how to derive elevations with GPS.



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SRD MANAGER'S REPORT

The following graph shows the volume of plans processed through SRD in the past 12 months. As always, we are showing them in comparison to the averages of past years. The number of plans we

have received at SRD during this period is about 5% below average. Ordinarily, this shortfall would have us watching our budget and biting our nails. But this year is different. On June 1, 1997, Surveyor's Location Certificates (SLC's) became subject to the SRD process and that has dramatically increased our workload and our revenue. As it looks now, SRD should finish the year with a surplus of approximately \$15,000.

By mid-August, when this article was written, we had processed 2244 plans and issued 4400 SLC numbers. We had 35 field checks partially completed and we were about one third of the way through our systematic plan checks. With

the exception of the systematic plan checks, we are pretty well on schedule. The introduction of the location certificates has definitely set us back, but we plan to be caught up by year's end.

This September will mark the third full year of operation for the Survey Review Department out of the Ingonish office. The location has worked out well. Our operation is efficient and effective and our members seem pleased with the level of service. Having said that, we still welcome all comments and suggestions both positive and negative. 

ZONE 5 JOHN S. POPE, NSLS, CLS



We extend our deepest sympathy to his family.

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
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SRD Takes the Gloves Off!

Price Cutting - Without a doubt, the most common complaint we hear from our members is that far too often they have to compete with members who charge unreasonably low prices for their services. It is even more maddening when a member loses a job to a lower price and later discovers that the surveyor cut corners by not following the regulations. This is usually when SRD gets asked what we are going to do about it. Well, we have been doing something Any member who about it. undercuts prices to attract business is hurting everyone in the profession. If SRD can help to level the playing field through stricter enforcement of the regulations, then we will do just that.

E-do-over - When we encounter a problem with a plan or a survey, or if a member brings a problem to our attention, we take a careful look at other plans and other surveys done by the surveyor. If we find similar problems, we get them fixed. In the last year we have sent many members back into the field to cut out lines or to set markers. One member had to travel the entire length of the province just to fix a survey. Another inspection uncovered a pattern of reoccurring problems that resulted in amendments to eighteen separate surveys.

We have found that most members want to cooperate with SRD but, of course, there are always a few who end up being referred to the Complaints Committee. We know as well as anyone who the problem

surveyors are and we monitor them as best we can. When we suspect that a member is cutting corners, we conduct spot checks at every opportunity. And we get lots of help from those members who never hesitate to report a violator. Especially when the violator is also undercutting prices.

The SRD / Administration Review Committee has informed us that they will be recommending to Council that SRD begin a cursory review process for all plans. This means that all 4000 or more plans will be viewed when they arrive at SRD. In addition, we will continue our systematic review of a minimum of one plan per member per year. As in the past, we will conduct comprehensive reviews as we see fit. The SRD / Administration Review Committee would also like to see us adopt a near-zero tolerance policy. They estimate that approximately 40% of all plans contain some minor violations and they feel that is simply not acceptable. They have expressed the opinion that SRD should take a firm stand with violators by sending more of them to the Complaints Committee.

Surveyor's Location Certificates

As you all know, since June 1, 1997, members have been sending their Surveyor's Location Certificates (SLC) to SRD. By the middle of August, we had issued about 4400 SLC numbers. The certificates are now flowing in at a regular pace and, in general, the quality appears to be very good. Having said that, members are reminded that the lettering quality is to be

equivalent to that given by mechanical lettering guides. This seems to be one of the more common problems we are faced with. Members are also reminded that SLC numbers are to be placed on all types of location certificates, including plans.

Key Plans - All too often we encounter a key plan that simply does not get us to the site. This is. after all, what it is supposed to do. A good key plan works in conjunction with the diagram to provide very specific directions to the property. Keep in mind that all sorts of people will be using the key Power crews, telephone installers, culvert installers, health inspectors, prospective purchasers and even the client, in some instances. And let's not forget the SRD manager! If we spend an hour driving around in circles looking for the property, we can't guarantee a very favourable report. Oh, and another thing, please show the civic number if it is available. This makes the search a lot easier. Incidentally, you can now find us on the Internet at "srd@nscn.ns.ca".

ATLANTIC PROVINCES BOARD OF EXAMINERS FOR LAND SURVEYORS

February 1997 - I attended, as Chairman of APBELS, a joint meeting in Ottawa with representatives of the Western Provinces Board of Examiners for Land Surveyors (WPBELS), the Board of Examiners for Canada Lands Surveyors (BECLS) and the Canadian Council of Land Surveyors (CCLS). The meeting was regarding participation in the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between APBELS, WPBELS and BECLS.

Starting in February 1998, candidates from the three boards will, where required, write common exams set and marked by BECLS.

Applications will continue to be processed by the respective boards.

May 1997 - The 25th meeting of APBELS was held in St. John's, Newfoundland in conjunction with the Association of Newfoundland Land Surveyors' agm.

Statistics for the period July 1, 1996 to June 1997:

- Four APBELS exams were written, three of which earned passing grades.
- Nine new candidates registered with the board.
- Two candidates received their certificates.
- Four files were closed due to inactivity.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

- A syllabus review is ongoing.
- Financial: the year started in the red and ended in the black due in part to reduced travel.
- The board approved an increase in dues of \$2 per land surveyor (from \$3 to \$5 each).

The Nova Scotia appointees to the board are: Grant McBurney, Paul Slaunwhite and John MacInnis.

CCLS

The Canadian Council of Land Surveyors held two meetings during the past year. The fall meeting was held in Digby, NS, in conjunction with ANSLS's 46th agm. At that meeting, the NAFTA presentation was finalized and presented to our Since representatives of CCLS have made the NAFTA presentation to other provincial associations. NAFTA agreement on geomatics focuses on two aspects - setting standards for providing geomatics services in the international marketplace; and reserving cadastral surveying as a special case that is still subject to specific provincial There are still requirements. ongoing discussions between representatives of Canada, the USA and Mexico to develop a draft agreement.

The subject of self-funded liability insurance was discussed in detail in The CCLS Professional Digby. Liability Insurance Committee proposed a separate insurance corporation offering a reciprocal insurance plan. The Association of Ontario Land Surveyors made a presentation which proposed expanding their existing partially self-funded program to the national level under CCLS. In order to determine which proposal was most suitable, the CCLS directors decided to have an insurance actuary evaluate each proposal and prepare a report which was presented at the CCLS agm in June 1997.

The CCLS agm was held in PEI in conjunction with the Association of PEI Land Surveyors' annual meeting. The actuarial report was the main topic of discussion. In essence, the report indicated that now would not be a good time to start a self-funded insurance program. The competition in the insurance marketplace is keeping premiums down and the number of claims is low. Insurance claims are cyclical and are usually low fol-lowing an economic recession. However, the report indicated that self-funded insurance may be a viable option in the next few years as competition drives some of the insurance companies out of busi-ness and the number of claims ris-es due to increased workloads.

There will be number of changes to the CCLS Board of Directors in the upcoming year. Brian Munday, CCLS Executive Director, has resigned and taken the position of Executive Director with the Alberta

Land Surveyors' Association. John Pope has taken over as the Nova Scotia director and will undoubtedly do a very good job. Gordon Isaacs, who is a member of both the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick associations, will be representing New Brunswick. The Complaints Committee has held regular meetings once a month over the past twelve months (September 96 to August 97).

Individually and in small groups, we have met at other times with complainants and surveyors and have carried out field investigations.

Twelve new files were opened during this report period. Six complaints were laid in 1997 to August 22, 1997. These formed part of twenty-four active files. Presently there are sixteen active files.

Two of the complaints are being referred to the Discipline Committee.

The complaints were laid by the general public, a land surveyor and the Survey Review Department. The nature of the complaints received and reviewed by the committee over the twelve month reporting period include: not responding to SRD, communications and boundaries.

The committee for 1997 consists of Carl Hartlen, David Hiltz, Allen Owen, Ted Webber and John Mac-Innis.

I would like to thank all the committee members for their dedication, support and time in attending meetings and carrying out the necessary investigations and the preparation of reports and letters.

Subsequent to the 46th annual meeting at Digby, each member of our committee has reviewed the advisory opinion of the Director of Investigation and Research for the Competition Bureau, Industry Canada (R.W. McCrone, Chief, Division 'A' Criminal Matters Branch). This opinion was with respect to our proposed fee study.

On February 1, 1997 a meeting was held at the committee workshop in Truro. Members anticipating inability to attend were encouraged to send written submissions detailing any desired direction or concerns regarding the proposed study. It should be noted that all members present were active in the area of private practice. Discussions considered the usefulness in the light of investigations and charges of price-fixing in other Canadian and US jurisdictions, as well as the response of the Competition Bureau.

Committee Reports (continued)

The consensus of the committee was not to proceed with a fee study. This is the recommendation of the Fee Study Committee to the ANSLS Council concerning the fee study.

Discussions of the fee study did, however, produce the following conclusions of the committee:

- 1. Area rates Charge for services seems to be heavily weighted by the area of operation. Competition, size of service area, proximity to research facilities, salaries, travel costs, etc. all dictate the cost of a survey. A fee schedule would have to be regional to be realistic.
- 2. Business practice The consensus of the committee members was that while some surveyors may provide an hourly rate for certain services, the general practice was to estimate individual projects. It was felt that survey fees should be left to individual practitioners who best understand their own situations. The unique nature of individual surveys mandates local knowledge as a necessity in pricing.
- 3. Survey standards Examples of poor quality work performed at low rates seem to be common across the province. This could indicate that SRD is only a plan check and not really identifying problem areas in research and field execution. This type of situation tends to dramatically slant the results of a study. When surveys are performed at low rates, subsequent costs to resurvey a parcel or any of the adjoiners are increased.

GANS LIAISON

The Geomatics Association of Nova Scotia (GANS) is comprised of members from the private sector. government and educational institutes. The object of GANS is to provide a forum for those who have an interest in geomatics. As with many volunteer organizations, there is a constant struggle to increase membership and provide worthwhile services to members. GANS is presently revitalizing their newsletter in an effort to keep members informed about what is happening in the geomatics sector. Earlier this year there was a presentation by Roger Tomlinson in Halifax. Mr. Tomlinson is considered one of the foremost experts in geomatics in Canada.

Plans are currently underway for the Geomatics Atlantic 97 Conference, which will be held at the World Trade and Convention Centre in Halifax on October 27, 28 and 29, 1997. The Association of Nova Scotia Land Surveyors is co-sponsoring this conference. ANSLS is also considering presenting a one-day workshop on "Copyright" in conjunction with the College of Geographic Sciences. Plans for the workshop are still preliminary.

GANS is in the process of seeking administrative support for their ongoing operation. Our Council approved submitting a proposal to provide administrative support to GANS for a specified fee. We have not learned if they will accept our offer.

It is definitely worthwhile for land surveyors to become members of GANS. As a member, you can attend various conferences and would be more informed about geomatics activity in Nova Scotia. The more you understand about the broad field of geomatics, the better prepared you will be to compete in business in the future.

PRIVATE PRACTICE

The Private Practice Committee consists of two sub-committees - the Department of Transportation Liaison Committee and the Planning Act Committee.

The Department of Transportation Liaison Committee has not been as active this year as last. Following the agm in Digby, the committee met to finalize the brief to be sent to the department. The final version of the brief entitled "Authority and Responsibilities of Nova Scotia Land Surveyors within the Department and the Nova Scotia Department of Transportation Resident Engineer Field Manual" was forwarded to the department in December 1996 along with a covering letter requesting an opportunity to review the document with government rep-resentatives. A memo was sent to the department in the spring of 1997 as a follow-up to the December correspondence. We have not received a response from the department as of July 31. 1997. A second memo was sent in August requesting a meeting to discuss the issues identified in the brief. We will continue to try and meet with representatives of the Department of Transportation and Public Works and hopefully be able to influence the role of land surveyors within the department in a positive manner.

The Planning Act is undergoing a detailed review by the government. It is anticipated that the Planning Act may be included as part of the proposed Municipal Government Act. At this time, the amendments made to the Planning Act have not been approved by the government. Last year our association had the opportunity to review the proposed changes to the Planning Act. We submitted a brief to government identifying concerns and offering recommendations. We also met with representatives of the Department of Housing and Muni-cipal Affairs on several occasions to discuss our views.

In November 1996, we were asked to provide input with respect to "Instrument of Subdivision" and new lots between 4 hectares and 10 hectares in size. The recommendation being put forward by the government committee is to eliminate the Instrument of Subdivision and have all new lots up to 4 hectares in size surveyed and approved. New lots greater than 10 hectares would not need to be approved or surveyed. This leaves new lots between 4 and 10 hectares in a state of uncertainty. After considering input from members, a letter was forwarded to the Department of Housing and Municipal Affairs on February 5, 1997. We recommended that any new boundaries being created for lots between 4 and 10 hectares be surveyed in accordance with our regulations. All other boundaries would only be a graphic representation and not certified. On May 13, 1997, we



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

met with representatives of government to discuss our proposal in detail. The government committee is recommending that the Instrument of Subdivision be removed from the revised Planning Act and that all lots up to 10 hectares in size be properly surveyed and approved. If government does not accept their recommendations, they will propose a version of a partial sur-vey for large lots as outlined in our February letter.


